


Rubens's Great Landscapes

Programme

This year, for the first time in more than two hundred years, we reunite Rubens's two masterpieces of landscape: the National Gallery's *A View of Het Steen in the Early Morning* and our own *The Rainbow Landscape*. To mark the event, this conference draws together an international panel of eminent conservators and scholars – the first in many years to focus exclusively on Rubens as a landscape painter.

Our first day will explore Rubens's own distinctive creative methods and compositional approach, including recent technical analyses of three of his most famous landscape compositions. Our second day will explore the broader art historical context of Rubens's late landscapes, the inspiration he took from his beloved country estate 'Het Steen', the generative forces of Nature he delighted in observing, as well as the earlier visual sources he emulated.

We will also address the wider impact and legacy of Rubens's compositions on the development of landscape painting, particularly in the northern provinces of the Netherlands, while also tracing the trajectory of *Het Steen* and *The Rainbow Landscape* from Rubens's lifetime to the foundation years of the National Gallery and the Wallace Collection.
